Answers to the Quick Quiz . . . and More

1. All but d. We requested JOHN but the others are good reminders, too:

God or with fellow Christians. *Koinonia* was used in particular with the early Christian community. (Of which – of course – St. John was a member!)

A synonym would be "fellowship" -- an association of people who share common beliefs or activities. (Say, that has a familiar ring to it, doesn't it?)
