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# **Bread!**

#### Kumala Bread

1 cup evaporated milk

1 cup flour

1 cup finely shredded yellow kumala (sweet potato)

1/2 cup sugar

2 1/2 teaspoons of baking powder

lemon rind

Sift dry ingredients and then add shredded kumala and lemon rind. Add milk and mix thoroughly. Pour in a wellgreased pan and bake in a moderately hot oven for 40 minutes.



Might as well buy a few extra sweet potatoes while you're at it. Great for baking like any potato — and for pies!



Mississippi Cornbread

2 to 4 tablespoons shortening (or use part or all bacon drippings)

1 1/2 cups white self-rising cornmeal 1/2 cup all-purpose flour

1 eag

1/2 cup buttermilk or whole milk

1/4 teaspoon of baking soda if using buttermilk

water to make a thick but pourable batter

Preheat the oven to 425° F (220° C).

Put the shortening in a cast-iron skillet and place on medium heat or in the oven.

Combine the cornmeal and flour, then mix in the egg and milk. Add water slowly, until the mixture is pourable (like thick pancake batter).

Take the hot pan from the oven, pour some of the melted shortening (a tablespoon or more) into the batter, then pour the batter into the hot pan. Place back in the oven and bake for 20 to 25 minutes, until the outer crust is golden brown.

(No self-rising cornmeal? 1 cup plain cornmeal + 1 1/2 tsp baking powder + 1/2 tsp salt makes 1 cup self-rising cornmeal.)
