## FSJC Marks Fifth Anniversary Fourth in a Four-part Series


Monica and Bill Dodds began the Friends of St. John the Caregiver six years ago, in the fall of 2005.

Did FSJC get some sort of Vatican approval before naming St. John the patron of caregivers? No. Typically and historically, that's not how a patron is first chosen. It's not really grassroots but more . . . "pew roots."

Did "St. John the Caregiver" immediately catch on because it is such an obvious choice? Oh my, yes! And the idea continues to gain public and ecclesiastical approval.

#### If You're a Caregiver, You're Also . . .

(This is the family column Monica and Bill Dodds wrote last month for Catholic New Service.)

As the Church marks Respect Life Month 2011, we want to say "thank you" to family caregivers. We know you're keeping busy so we suspect you may not have had time to notice that caregiving is much more than

what it seems to be at first glance.

Yes, it's all those obligations, commitments, details, and worries, but if you're caregiving you're also:

--Obeying the fourth and



fifth commandment. (Honor your father and your mother, and you shall not kill.) You're showing your respect for your parent or other senior family member in a tremendous way by taking care of him or her. And, at a time when euthanasia advocates are becoming more vocal, you're promoting life by helping your care-receiver. Caregiving is pro-life!

--Honoring your marriage vows. Perhaps most brides and grooms focus on "for richer or for poorer" and don't realize what "in sickness and in health" can truly mean. Now you know. And you're there, fulfilling that commitment.

--Living the corporal works of mercy. Those include feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, clothing the naked, sheltering the homeless, visiting the sick and those in prison, and burying the dead.

Some of those seem obvious if, for example, your spouse needs assistance eating or dressing. What about sheltering the homeless if you and your care-receiver don't live in the same place? It could be you make that assisted-living or long-term-care-center room "home" by your visiting him or her. What about prison? As a mind and body deteriorate, a person can feel imprisoned. And you're there. And burying the dead? That day may come. And, in the meantime, you may play a role in helping your loved one prepare for death.

--Picking up your cross daily. In Luke 9:23-24, Jesus teaches, "Then he said to all, 'If anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me. For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will save it." It may not be on a daily basis, but caregiving involves sacrifice. It includes "dying to yourself" for the sake of your loved one.

--Being as surprised as the "sheep" on judgment day. In Matthew 25:31-46, the "righteous" ask, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you?" And, the king answers, "Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me."

What you're doing for your care-receiver, you're doing for Christ.
