# FSJC Marks Fifth Anniversary Third in a Four-part Series

Monica and Bill Dodds began the Friends of St. John the Caregiver five years ago, in the fall of 2005.

To mark this milestone, we're sharing some of "the rest of the story."

#### CatholicCaregivers.com

In the very early days of FSJC Monica was giving a brief presentation to pastors who had gathered for a deanery meeting. They knew it wasn't unusual to have some sort of "sales pitch" at their monthly gathering and so most listened with only half an ear until she pointed out:

"And that's why there's no cost to the parish and why it doesn't take up any staff time."

Heads popped up. The shuffling of papers ended. Attention zeroed in on *this* quest.

YourAgingParent.com was designed to help family caregivers and CatholicCaregivers.com (the second program under the FSCJ umbrella) was set up to help parishes and dioceses help them.

Having spent many years as volunteers and paid staff members for the Church, Monica and Bill knew no matter how wonderful —or needed — a service might be, funding and staff time would be two stumbling blocks that would hamper a parish or diocese using it.

Monthly "bulletin briefs" (short quotes recognizing and encouraging caregivers), prayers of intercession for Sunday Masses, and a flier on a caregiving topic made it easy (and cheap!) for a parish to help its caregivers. And there's never a fee for training or a workshop for a parish or diocese.

#### 'Caregiving is pro-life!'

And in that early time, it didn't seem possible but an Internet search showed no "hits" for the phrase "caregiving is pro-life."

FSJC was the first to use that obvious and oh-so true statement. It became the "tagline" for CatholicCaregivers.com.

Here, for example, is the first prayer:

至聖聖神,引領我作為給予照顧者在我旅途上。路上的每一步我 需要你。我不曉得此旅程將持續多久。請賜我安慰及休息當我完 成時。阿們。

In English, it's: "Most Holy Spirit, guide me on my journey as a caregiver. Each step of the way I need you. I don't know how long this trip will last. Please give me comfort and rest when I'm done. Amen."

I have been caring for my 91-yearold mom for 15 months non-stop now, with no help. I work full time as well and lately just feel more and more burnt out. Please keep me in your prayers to give me strength and patience with this journey that I am on.
