On the Lighter Side ... You Might Just Be a Caregiver


—If you not only know the flavors that Ensure comes in but have sampled each (and have a favorite) . . .

The Colors

You may notice that each site has the same simple design and layout but each has its own color.

YourAgingParent.com is purple. ("When I am old, I shall wear purple.")

CatholicCaregivers.com is red. (Liturgical color of the Holy Spirit, who — very early on — we asked to oversee the marketing department and he has done an *outstanding* job.)

And FSJC.org is blue. (A tip of the hat to Our Lady in Need.)

The Tags

Each site also has a "tag line" offering a brief description of the site's contents and the program's purpose.

YourAgingParent.com: "Spirituality, Information and Resources for Family

Caregivers."

CatholicCaregivers.com: "Caregiving is pro-life."

FSJC.org: "Promoting care for the caregiver!"

The Audiences

What about "targets" or "audiences? As the home page of YourAgingParent.com notes: "This site is designed for adult children caring for an aging parent but most of the material also applies if you're helping your spouse, or assisting a child or sibling with special needs, or a friend or family member."

There's also material here for carereceivers. (That's one of the changes we made based on what caregivers and care-receivers — told about their experiences and their needs.

Every Monday there's a new "Dear Friends" letter on the home page.

CatholicCaregivers.com is designed for parishes and dioceses. (Free and easy!) Material is preformatted so that

it can be downloaded and photocopied. The site features:

- —a new flier each month (suitable for a parish bulletin or a diocesan gathering, for example) on a specific caregiving topic;
- —"bulletin briefs" (short quotes on the importance of caregiving and of supporting caregivers):
- —and a caregiver-themed prayer of intercession for each Sunday of the year.

There are also some mini-posters there, suitable for vestibule or narthex bulletin boards.

FSJC.org gives visitors information on the organization itself, including how to become a member. And it explains the three components of the entire ministry.

A fourth site that has FSJC material is YouTube. Our "channel" is <u>JohnThe-Caregiver</u>. The videos there are also available (for free, of course!) on DVD. (They're included on the order form that's sent with the newsletter.)
